Rebate offered to desex cats and dogs

Fraser Coast pet owners who are concession card holders now have an incentive to desex their cats and dogs.

Council has adopted a new program to provide eligible pet owners with a \$100 rebate for dogs and a \$50 rebate for cats that have recently been desexed.

While desexing costs vary due to factors such as breed, weight and age, the reimbursement is about 25 per cent of the average cost of desexing a dog or a cat.

The reimbursement is available to eligible Queensland Concession Card holders such as seniors, people with a disability, carers, sole parents, widows and students.

The aim of the incentive is to reduce the number of unwanted cats and dogs on the Fraser Coast.

While Council has previously sponsored desexing programs through donations to the RSPCA and the National Desexing Network, neither offered dog desexing on the Fraser Coast, meaning local pet owners had to travel to vets in Bundaberg or Gladstone.

The new animal desexing reimbursement program allows Council to engage directly with Fraser Coast residents and local vets.

Dog rego inspections start

Fraser Coast dog owners who are yet to register their dogs are urged to do so as soon as possible.

Registering your dog with Council every year is a requirement under Queensland Government law.

Ensuring your dog is registered and microchipped helps reduce the number of animals that end up at the pound and makes it easier for Council to reunite lost pets with their owners.


It is free to register your dog for the first time on the Fraser Coast.

Council's annual dog registration inspection program starts in March this year and runs through to the end of August.

Council staff and contractors conducting the inspections will visit homes across the region between 7am and 5pm Monday to Saturday.

Big year for the Brolga Theatre

Almost 30,000 people attended performances at the Brolga Theatre in 2022 and 2023 is shaping up to be an even bigger year.

The Brolga Theatre and Convention Centre in Maryborough is the entertainment heart of the region, regularly hosting national and international performers, award dinners, school formals, expos, trade shows and conferences both large and small.

Like all arts and performance venues, the Brolga Theatre was hit hard by COVID-19 closures in 2020, hosting 12 performances attended by about 4000 patrons, but the Brolga has bounced back over the past two years.

In 2021, the Brolga Theatre hosted 95 performances attended by almost 28,000 patrons, and that number grew to 111 performances attended by almost 30,000 patrons in 2022.

Highlights in 2022 included Queensland Ballet's Giselle, Xavier Rudd, Amy Shark, Human Nature, Kate Ceberano, The Ten Tenors and six local dance school concerts.

2023 is shaping up to be even bigger with many shows already on sale and more being added weekly.

Some of the shows on sale now include Anh Do, Cirque Mother Africa, Wendy Matthews and Grace Knight, and Celtic Illusion, to name just a few.

WetSide going from strength to strength

More than 10,000 people visited Hervey Bay's WetSide Water Park from Boxing Day to New Year's Eve 2022 – the largest number of visitors in a week since the park opened 13 years ago.

WetSide is a great place to keep cool and have fun with something for everyone, including waterslides, a water play arena, TotSide for under-fives play as well as a new Aqua Ninja course that is the first of its kind in Australia.

Council undertook an extensive maintenance program in 2022, including resurfacing all the softfall in the main area, and more than 50,000 people visited the refreshed facility between October and December 2022.

More than 1,000 people challenged themselves on the Aqua Ninja adventure course in its first two months of operation while more than 5,000 water slide passes were sold in the first three months of the 2022/23 season.
