

Grass Cutting in Parks and Reserves

Fraser Coast Regional Council maintains over 10,255 hectares of grass across our region, including grass cutting in more than 1000 parks, reserves, and roadsides.

Mowing Program Scheduling

Adhering to scheduled maintenance is more time and cost effective for the rate payer.

The council programs its grass-cutting schedule on a seasonal basis.

The frequency of service increases in summer when grass grows faster, however, this can be disrupted by significant rainfall or periods of extended dry weather.

In these events, services are rescheduled as soon as it is safe and practical to do so. **The area has not been**

forgotten or missed and our team are on their way.

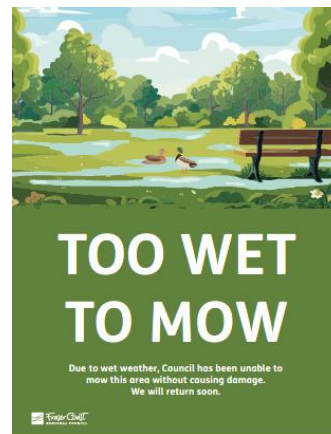


have catchers. The grass clippings (which looks like clumping) will break down naturally after a couple of mows.

While we welcome the rain over the summer period, it's sunny days and dry ground that make for perfect mowing conditions.

If you notice a greenspace in your local area that is overgrown, chances are it's due to recent or current weather conditions and the ground needs to dry further before it can be cut.

The heavy mowers Council use can weigh up to eight tonnes. If the mowing teams commence too early and we mow when it is too wet, they can become bogged causing costly and time-consuming damage, such as wheel ruts.

The peak growing season for our region is usually November to May.
